ANNUAL MEETING SCHEDULE OF EVENTS

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 10[™]

Our meeting will be based out of the Red Lion Hotel in Richland, WA. Guests will arrive at the hotel to check in after 3:00 PM. Our hospitality suite will be open 3:30 PM - 9:00 PM featuring Washington State amenities. "Tour of Traps": Numerous exotic insect traps will be set up on the hotel grounds. From the hospitality suite guests can take their refreshments with on a self-guided tour where the type, purpose of each trap, along with pests targeted and damage caused described. A guided tour is also planned that evening. Dinner will be on your own.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 11™

Buffet style breakfast will be served in the hotel banquet room, followed by our Opening Meeting, Welcome, and Introductions. We will then travel to Zen-Noh Hay, Co for a facility tour and presentation on forage export requirements and procedures. Black Stem Rot



Fall garden mums will soon be appearing for sale at retail nurseries near you and there's a yet another plant pathogen to be on the lookout for.

<u>Phythopthora chrysanthemi</u> (a water mold) had previously been identified in Japan and Croatia and now the U.S.

P. chrysanthemi is considered "high temperature tolerant" and can be an issue in the more arid areas of the west as well as in cooler climates.

Disease symptoms overlap in symptomatology with other pathogens such as plant stunting, chlorosis, vein reddening, wilting, and dieback of all or part of the plants. Severe infections express a distinctly black stem rot extended from the soil line to the lower branches.

This new species may not be of any more concern than other plant pathogens already on industry's radar. Introduction pathways are most likely with propagative material along with poor management practices.
